I was reminded recently of the following story which involved the great artist Michelangelo:

You may know that one of his masterpieces is the statue of the shepherd boy David which he carved out of marble, but did you know that he carved it out of a piece of rejected marble? A fellow artist in Italy had originally ordered a block of marble, but when it arrived, it was too narrow to be of any use so he refused to accept it. Michelangelo studied the rejected stone for a while then decided he would take it. That stone became one of the most loved sculptures done by Michelangelo.

The famous statue of David contains a number of distinctive features. If it were possible to see the top of David's head and the soles of his feet you would see spots of unchiseled marble. On close viewing, you would notice that the right elbow hugs the side as the right hand goes over the shoulder to hold the strings of David's sling; you would also see how the full length of the left arm presses against the side as the left hand reaches to take a stone from the pouch; many notice too that the left knee bends inward toward the right upon which the weight of the figure rests itself.

What everyone does not know, and what enhances the beauty and the wonder of the artist's achievement, is the fact that all these distinctive features were done in order to keep within the narrow limits imposed by the rejected marble block. Michelangelo, in other words could have sculptured his statue differently if he had had another piece of stone with which to work. But, taking the stone which was rejected, Michelangelo had to work within certain limits. The result was not some stunted or flawed piece of art, but one of the world's great masterpieces.

The lesson is obvious. Sometimes we find ourselves limited. We think we don't have enough talent, or enough time, or enough money, or whatever else. Consequently, we convince ourselves that we cannot do anything worthwhile. So, we don't even make an effort.

There is a more Godly way of looking at life. It is related to the way Michelangelo looked at the piece of marble. It is to look not at the problems, but at the possibilities. It is to say, "This is what God

has given me to work with. I will use it to the best of my ability." It is amazing what can happen when we see and use our talents and gifts as though they were on loan to us from God. God, like the artist, is a master at taking the stones which others reject and making something special of them.

Greetings St Paul Lutheran!

The last couple of weeks a group of us have been meeting on Tuesday evenings to talk

about some of our foundational Lutheran confessional documents, including the Large and Small catechisms as well as the Augsburg Confession. I have to say, I've really been enjoying the opportunity and I'm looking forward to continuing through the next few weeks of the class. It's a short class—we're only meeting six times—and there are probably so many more things that we could talk about than we have time for. But the class has us thinking about a few key things, and these are things we can all be thinking about, even if you aren't in the class. As we've been starting to look at the different parts of the Catechisms, there are a couple of large questions for us: 1) what does it mean to be a Lutheran, or have a Lutheran understanding of things, and 2) How can we encounter or use different pieces of the Catechisms in our regular prayer life, or when do we take time to think about these things besides confirmation? Catechesis, being formed in the faith, is a process that is always happening. We Lutherans have a life of faith that is shaped in the historic symbols of the church (the 10 Commandments, the Creed,

and the Lord's Prayer) and is lived out sacramentally (through Baptism and Holy Communion in particular). I wanted to share a bit of that with everyone, and encourage us all to think about those questions and how we can continue to learn and grow in our faith, and nurture our community.

COUNCIL MINUTES JANUARY 12, 2017

The minutes from December 15, 2016 were accepted as printed.



- **Treasurer** Treasurer's report was accepted as presented.
- **Youth** No scout troops in the area are interested in acquiring the church's Boy Scout trailer so the Austin area council will be contacted to see if there are any troops in need of a trailer.
- **Worship** There will be a First Communion training Jan 21st and an acolyte training on Feb. 5th.
- Social Concerns The YAM building is on schedule for an early summer completion, in addition Sharon Metting from YAM expressed her thanks to St Paul for the help in making YAM a successful project over the years.
- **Property** Wayne met with Thomas Stepanski who indicated that 1½ inch square tubing would satisfy ADA requirements for hand rails. Thomas will give a bid for this project. Augustin Reza will be giving a bid on the covered walkway, the ramp at Pars 1 has been completed and the stains on the carpet by the elevator have been cleaned.
- Parish Ed Tina Boehm will be hosting an organizational meeting on Jan. 29 at 6 pm for this year's Community Wide VBS to be held at St. Paul. VBS for children ages 3-5 will continue to be held in the basement while VBS for children who have completed Kindergarten through grade school will be held in the Ed Building.
- C.E.M. The Learning Garden will hold it's Annual Board Meeting Jan. 24. Mrs. Donna Baxter is now teaching the PK4

- class with 11 currently enrolled. Total enrollment at The Learning Garden is 54 children.
- Outreach/Evangelism Ads were placed in the Victoria Advocate and Yorktown News for Christmas & New Year.
- Vicar Hans During December Hans participated in 10 worship services, 2 pastoral visits, 4 educational events & 1 church meeting. Official acts included a funeral on 12/23. Hans reported that one of his sermons was published in the Church Life Journal on Dec. 10. Vicar Hans also conducted the first of 6 classes about Catechism & Lutheran Confession. On the 22nd Vicar Hans will conduct the Sunday Service in Goliad, after helping with the Yorktown service.
- **Pastor Tim** reported that during December professional activities included 10 Worship services, 8 hospital visits, 3 home visits, 7 educational events, 6 church meetings & events, 2 community events and 1 week of vacation. Official Acts included a memorial service on 12/10 and a burial on 12/24.
- OLD BUSINESS The present benevolence budget is 15% distributed as follows: 6% NALC & 1% to each of the following; Cross Trails Ministry, Water to Thrive, Oromo Church, Church of the Living God (Chinese Church), Child Outreach International, NALC Seminary fund, Lead Star aka World Mission Prayer League, DeWitt County Gabriel Project and Local Benevolence. A motion was made seconded & passed to increase the benevolence to 16% for the 2017 budget.
- NEW BUSINESS a) A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve for Pastor Tim & Vicar Hans to attend a program on the Church and Persecution in Canmore, Alberta on May 9 12. b) A motion passed to give Pastor Tim vacation time from May 15 May 29. c) Council installation will be held immediately after the annual meeting. d) A motion passed to change the council meeting to the second Thursday of the month at 6:30 pm e) Appreciation was expressed to Beverly Feller for serving on the council.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

Words of Wellness for February 2017 "Spiritual Disciplines"

The Christian season of Lent begin March 1. For those who observe this season, it is a common practice to take on a new spiritual discipline for the seven weeks between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Spiritual disciplines are of course not unique to Christianity, but are practiced by followers of all faiths.

My wife recently led a three week parenting series for parents of children in our local school system. The topic of discipline came up, as it almost always does when we offer a parenting program. The parents were not asking about discipline in the spiritual sense, the kind people connect with seasons such as Lent, but rather about the topic of discipline as it relates to raising children.

Whenever my wife and I, who speak regularly as family therapists about parenting, are asked about the topic of discipline it gives us the opportunity to remind people that the root meaning of the word discipline is to teach. A disciple is a a person learning from a teacher. To knowledgeable in a certain discipline means that one can teach others about that subject. When we are talking with parents we explain that many parents commonly think of disciplining a child as synonymous with punishment. It is more accurate and far more helpful though, to think instead of disciplining a child as teaching a child. Any time a child misbehaves, a parent has an opportunity to teach, it is a teachable moment. The parent can show and demonstrate the behavior that would instead be more appropriate, safer or more desirable. The emphasis of a teaching based discipline versus a fear or guilt-based approach is an important distinction when thinking about the idea of discipline.

The same understanding of discipline applies to the practice of spiritual disciplines. Some approaches to Lent, and to spiritual disciplines in general, have emphasized fear and guilt, even the need at times to suffer. I choose to believe in a love-based approach to discipline, one that emphasizes

discipline as teaching. With this mindset, one takes on a spiritual discipline to learn about spiritual matters such as the importance of humility, gratitude, patience, delayed gratification, forgiveness, prayer, and service to others. Just as a person might have a discipline of practicing the piano in order to play more beautiful music, so too a person might take on a spiritual discipline to be able to live a more spiritual life, to deepen one's tendency to be humble, patient, prayerful, and grateful.

In my attempt to deepen my own spiritual life I have already started practicing a few spiritual disciplines for this Lent. I will be writing in a journal for fifteen minutes each day, specifically about two things. The first will be what I am grateful for that day, and the second will be what I either learned that day or what I had the chance to practice in terms of "letting go." "Letting Go with All Your Heart, Soul, Strength, and Mind" is the theme of the Living Compass Lenten booklet this year and so it was natural for me to focus on that as part of my journaling discipline. The other discipline I will be practicing this Lent is that of giving something away. Each day I will be packing up one item to give to Goodwill. At the end of the 40 days of Lent, I will take the 40 items to my local Goodwill store to drop them off. I still have a great deal to learn about letting go, gratitude, and simplifying my life and so this is my lesson plan for this Lent.

How about you? Have you considered observing Lent this year by taking on a spiritual discipline? If so, what do you hope to learn by doing so?


GOD'S CONVERSATION HEARTS
